

▼ Hurricane Florence Assistance

The Wayne County Department of Social Services Director Tammy Schrenker announced the United States Department of Agriculture approved a Hot Food Waiver for all Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) recipients in North Carolina. The wavier allows any FNS recipients to purchase hot foods and hot foods prepared for immediate consumption if they are purchased in a Food and Nutrition Service Authorized Retail Store in North Carolina. All Authorized Retailers in the State have been notified and are prepared to accept EBT cards for these purchases.

This Wavier is Effective Immediately and will end on October 31, 2018.

FEMA Disaster Assistance can help support your recovery from a major disaster. If you're ready to apply now for disaster assistance or would like more information on the types of assistance available please visit

Congratulations to Tamarra Small for being award the Victor C. Bell Jr. Scholarship! The Victor E. Bell, Jr. Scholarship is awarded to seventh graders to encourage and assist high potential NC students to pursue a college degree. Each recipient of the scholarship has an NC 529 College Savings account established with their name as the beneficiary. Each year that they qualify to renew the scholarship, from seventh grade through college graduation, \$2,000 is added to that account with a maximum contribution of \$20,000. Wanted: Applicants with documented workplace skills

To help you earn your NCRC or improve your scores, Wayne Community College offers training in an open lab-based environment. In this lab, you will have an opportunity to work with an instructor to assess your current skills, develop a personalized training plan, and hone your skills. In addition, you will be able to register for testing. A tuition fee waiver for this lab may be available for unemployed or underemployed individuals.

Polished soft skills win jobs!

Employees need both hard & soft skills to land jobs.

Hiring managers typically look for job candidates with both specific hard skills and soft skills. Hard skills are job-specific skills and knowledge you need to perform a job. But what are soft skills and how do they differ from hard skills?

Hard skills are skills you can gain through education, training programs, certifications, and on-the-job training. These are typically quantifiable skills that can be easily defined and evaluated. For example, a hard skill for an IT professional might be computer programming, while a hard skill for a carpenter might be a knowledge of wood framing.



Soft skills, on the other hand, are interpersonal (people) skills. These are much harder to define and evaluate. Soft skills include communication skills, listening skills, and empathy, among others.!






BACK TO SCHOOL CUTS2904 BARBER & BEAUTY SALON

Pay Attention to Attendance

Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School

via Attendance Works

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.



DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay on track to graduation.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10 percent, or about 18 days, of the school year can drastically affect a student's academic success.
- Students can be chronically absent even if they only miss a day or two every few weeks.
- Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from college and keep a job.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Make school attendance a priority

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school everyday, make that the expectation.
- Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- Don't let your child stay home unless truly sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety.

Help your teen stay engaged

- Find out if your child feels engaged by his classes and feels safe from bullies and other threats. Make sure he/she is not missing class because of behavioral issues and school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, work with your school.
- Stay on top of academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors if necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage meaningful afterschool activities, including sports and clubs.

Communicate with the school

- Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalities
- Talk to teachers if you notice sudden changes in behavior. These could be tied to something going on at school.
- Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not piling up.
- Ask for help from school officials, afterschool programs, other parents or community agencies if you're having trouble getting your child to school.
